

The first uniforms were white shirts and trousers which the members bought. Later the members bought some white caps; trimmed in black and purple. In 1939 Fred Cahoon became director of the band and held that position until he passed away in 1944. During hs tenure, purple capes were added to the uniforms. For a few months the band was without a director and some of the high school students did their best to keep the organization intact. In 1944-45 A. L. Chesley was the director for several months. James Stevens was the next director. With the beginning of the 1946-47 school term Roy Hensley became the director. Since its organization the band has done a lot to advertise Jacksboro. It has gone on motorcades, to band meets, to the Stock Show and many representing other places Jacksboro.




Kyle E. Ball of Mineral Wells has bought the City Drug Store, effective July 1st, from A. F. Little and W. E. Marr.


rooms for educational purposes for the Sunday school and other activities of the church, which is mach needed.




